2021 By the Numbers

2021 has been our strongest year ever for adoptions. It started with 81 adoptions in January. That's more than we've ever had in one month before. We have had above average adoptions in every month this year. If we just have a normal December we'll have 606 adoptions for the year. Previously, our best year was 2020 that saw 515 cats and kittens leave for new homes.

Since 2004, Cat Tails has adopted cats to people in North and South Carolina, Florida, Virginia, Maryland, Illinois and Quebec. But people always came to get the cats. Ricky was the second flame-point Siamese kitten that Lee Ann has adopted from us. She lives in Springfield, Illinois and this time she hired a company to bring the cat to her. Many Paws Volunteer Transport was very easy to work with. We had everything ready when they picked him up on August 28th. They drove, handing him off to other drivers every few hours until it was time for a "slumber party". The next morning he was back on the move and arrived on July 29th. The next time someone asks, we can recommend transporting a cat with Many Paws. When Ricky arrived with all of his paperwork, he was relaxed and happy.

Combating Stress



MY NEW CAT HIDES ALL THE TIME!

Cats don't adjust to changes quickly and being adopted is a major life change. Add in the fact that they may have just come from a foster home, to the vet for surgery, to Cat Tails, to Petsmart, to your house and you can understand why they may be nervous. Here are some tips to help your new cat adjust from Cornell University's College of Veterinary Medicine:

- 1. Be patient. Start in a small area and give the cat time to expand her territory on her own.
- 2. **Make sure your other pets are being polite**. Resident cats don't always give a warm welcome and a looming dog, even one that likes cats, can be frightening.
- 3. Hang out and chat. Get your new cat used to your voice and smell by spending time near her hiding place. Gradually, you can move closer or feed her while you're close.
- 4. **Physical contact on her terms**. Don't reach into her hiding place and pull her out. Let your new cat approach you and gradually see if she will let you rub her chin. Don't try to pick her up when she's only interested in exploring.
- 5. **Engage in play from a distance**. Toss a few treats slowly luring the cat out of her hiding place. A toy on a long string or a wand is a good way to slowly coax her out.
