We have about 35 volunteers who come in one or more days a week to clean, feed, water, medicate and socialize the cats. Then we have a bunch of people who don't come into the facility regularly. We have our favorite vet, Dr. Coble, and his staff at Port City Animal Hospital, who get our kittens healthy and spayed or neutered before they are adopted. We have people who sew, who run our shoe program and one who changes the filters in our air handling system. Our treasurer comes weekly for money and to take pictures for Facebook. We have Karen, Renee and Chris, our three main foster homes. We have people who make goodies for us to sell at adoption events and Sunset at Sunset. I'm sure I've forgotten some but you get the idea: as Cat Tails program has grown over the years, so has the number of good people needed to run it!

We also usually have several kinds of foods, so you can donate the food your cat now refuses to eat and pick up several other kinds to try. The food is all good and the rest of the stuff ranges from useable to brand new.
